Welcome to InTheNews – covering all the FM news you may have missed over the last week:

A hundred and twenty-three workers were killed in work-related accidents in Great Britain in the last year, according to figures published this week by the Health and Safety Executive (HSE).

The annual data release covers the period from April 2021 to March 2022, during which time most pandemic restrictions were lifted and the economy began returning to normal.

The industries with the highest deaths were construction (30), agriculture, forestry, and fishing (22), and manufacturing (22); though agriculture, forestry and fishing has the highest rate of fatal injury per 100,000 workers.

Workplace and facilities management thought leaders have warned that employers aren't doing enough to attract their people back to the office in new research released by IWFM in partnership with Ricoh.

Across a series of interviews discussing the future of work in a hybrid landscape, leading figures in the sector unanimously agree that hybrid working is here to stay, but challenges in encouraging people back to offices remain as one interviewee remarked, 'I don't want to go into the office for wall-to-wall Teams meetings'.
