BM have raised almost £50,000 in aid of the Order of St George's works in Ukraine through a second fundraising dinner.

The Golden Hearts Gala Dinner, held at Hogan Lovells in London, saw people from across the sector come together to help raise much needed funds for those impacted by the war in the Ukraine.

Funds raised will help provide medical equipment such as tourniquets and basic medical training for those on the frontline.

The event saw a panel of BM's Ukrainian team members invited to tell their stories and share their hopes for the future, as well as a charity auction.

Following a canapé and Champagne reception, guests were served cured salmon with heritage beetroots, cucumber, keta and buttermilk; fillet of Cumbrian beef with Roscoff onion, lovage emulsion, pommes Anna and truffled bone marrow jus; and Islands Chocolate marquise with figs and fig leaf oil.
