Over lunch, guests were invited on the Road to Net Zero. This was an exhibition showcasing all that Veolia is doing from point of collection, with inclusive solutions to recycling at home, through to the treatment of waste and the urgent need for carbon reduction throughout this whole journey, including innovative solutions such as carbon sequestration using algae.
