

## Safety Alert on Non-Compliant Safety Netting Practices

The National Federation of Roofing Contractors (NFRC), in collaboration with <u>FASET (Fall Arrest Safety</u> <u>Equipment Training)</u>, has released a crucial safety alert addressing significant concerns regarding noncompliant safety netting practices in the construction industry.

Instances have been reported by NFRC members where horizontal drainage installations precede safety netting setup. As a result, safety nets are positioned well below the recommended two-meter threshold, compromising safety and pushing net riggers to operate under conditions that diverge from FASET's installation guidelines.

The new safety alert aims to enlighten and encourage a reassessment of existing safety netting practices among roofing and principal contractors.

FASET's Managing Director, Tony Seddon, emphasises, "This safety alert is intended to highlight the correct phasing of installation works to reduce the risks associated with non-compliant practices. Adhering to FASET guidance, safety nets should be installed as near as possible to the work area, definitely within a 2-meter distance."



Mr. Seddon elaborates, "This initiative underlines the necessity for all stakeholders in safety netting, particularly roofing and principal contractors, to engage proactively with FASET and the guidance we make available via our website. Participation in FASET membership offers valuable access to FASET events, including the AGM, promoting an inclusive platform for knowledge and experience exchange within the construction sector. Such engagement significantly diminishes the likelihood of non-compliance incidents like those mentioned."
